

## **Participatory decision making**

'Team' is many things,  
but what I was trying to define it as,  
it's a network of people who represent  
National Theatre Wales in their community  
but also have a say in how  
National Theatre Wales is run.  
They feed into the organisation  
and make decisions with us  
on how the organisation is run.  
Obviously through the projects that people run,  
we like them to make the decisions for those projects,  
be it recruitment, publicity, financial.  
We like to give them that opportunity as well.  
I think that you've always got to be honest  
about what people's input is going to be used for.  
So, for example, when I'm doing  
the artistic programme for the year,  
everybody knows that ultimately  
I will have to sit down myself  
and make all the bits work together  
and at those points some decisions  
will have to be made;  
choices between one thing and another,  
one place and another, one artist and another.  
But I think if people can see that their input  
had a genuine impact on those decisions

they will feel that their input was worthwhile.

So, for example, one of the shows that's in the programme this year is one that I'm really excited that we're doing, but was not in my programme at all until I brought the programme to a team panel and looked at what was missing in it and they made some suggestions.

So I think that if people see real impact to the suggestions and ideas that they are having then they will continue to want to make input.

Sometimes you're asking people to share actual decision-making with you.

If, for example, a team panel member is part of an interview process, then they should have an equal say with anybody else who's in that interview about who gets the job or who gets the bursary or who gets the artist residency.

So I think you need to set it up in an honest way that fully informs people what they're getting involved in.

However, I think it is always really important that people know that their presence has a real impact on decision-making.

Purely being there in some sort of advisory input

that may or may not impact on decision-making

is, frankly, wasting people's time.
